Spring is Coming! Activities to Look Forward to!

<u>Pickleball</u> is coming to the Valley! Laurel and Kelly....it's true! Construction of the new Pickleball court will begin in June of this year. It will be located 5 kms East of Fruitvale, in Area A, at the beautiful Marsh Creek Family Park. The location was chosen because there is an old, under-utilized basketball court in the Park, so the members of the Beaver Valley Recreation Committee (Mayors Steve & Mike, and Ali - RDKB) decided to re-purpose the unused court into a regulation Pickleball court. That adds another draw to Marsh Creek Park, which is also the setting of a professional disc golf course that is highly used year round! A huge thank you to COLUMBIA BASIN TRUST for a contribution of \$35K - we love the CBT!!

Many people have shifted from tennis to pickleball as it is less intense, easier to master, and it keeps the racket lovers active. Pickleball was initiated in 1965, by three U.S. dads trying to entertain their kids. It mixes table tennis, tennis and badminton, and can be played as singles or doubles. Why is it called Pickleball? There are a couple of explanations to pick from: one, because it is a combination of different sports it reminded one of the inventors' wives of the so-called "pickle boat," when oarsmen were chosen from the leftovers of others crews, and two, the sport was named after a dog, "Pickle," who liked to chase the ball. I prefer the latter, as it is much more fun!

Bocce too?!

You betcha! A Bocce Pit Plan is the result of another great partnership with Area A and the Village of Fruitvale. After a discussion with Mayor Steve and Council, a location behind the Fruitvale Memorial Hall was determined as a central, accessible location. The bocce pit will offer visiting campers an enjoyable pastime while they visit our Village, and there is generous parking available for local users as well. Details will be forthcoming.

Bocce ball is an ancient sport that goes back to the Roman Empire. The first documented game of Bocce was depicted in a 5200 B.C. painting that showed two boys playing the game. The painting was in a Egyptian tomb. Some folks also refer to the game as lawn bowling. It is a game for everyone! It is considered a very versatile game in which the rules may be "negotiated" by the players. I hope many people will enjoy playing Bocce in Fruitvale.

DID YOU KNOW...

Burning and Wood Waste Policy 3.06/Fire Safety and Prevention Bylaw 749, 2006



The Village Office continues to receive complaints about the smell and the smoke coming from illegal open burning fires and wood stove/fireplace fires.

Residents are reminded that there is **no open burning** allowed in the Village of Fruitvale and burning any materials other than seasoned firewood (ie: plastic and plastic bags, household garbage, recyclable material, etc.) **is not allowed.**

The only permissible outdoor fires are **small** back-yard campfires (0.5 m X 0.5m in size) burning **seasoned firewood** only and the flames must be kept low.

All paper, cardboard and other recyclable products must be recycled appropriately.

Part 4B - Dogs

With the melting snow comes dog poop on boulevards and around sidewalks that hasn't been picked up over the winter. Dog owners are again reminded to pick up your dog's poop and dispose of it lawfully. Use a "doggie-do-do" waste bag to pick up the poop, take it back to your house and dispose of it properly (in a Village of Fruitvale garbage bag) or drop the little bag in a designated waste bin provided by the Village. "Doggie-do-do" bag stations are placed at various locations around the Village. Grab a couple bags and keep our boulevards and sidewalks clear. Keeping feces off the sidewalks and boulevards keeps the community clean and your dog safe from diseases.

With the nicer weather, residents are enjoying the outdoors. In addition to the requirements of the Anti-Noise Bylaw, dog owners must not allow their dog to bark, howl, or cry for ten minutes or more without significant periods of rest; or otherwise in such a manner as to cause a nuisance. Dog owners must not permit their dog to bark during evening hours.

If you haven't purchased a dog tag/license for your dog over 4 months of age, now is the time to do so. Costs are \$25 for a spayed or neutered dog or \$75 for an intact dog. Tags can be purchased at the Village Office. Dog tags must be placed on your dog's collar and the collar worn by your dog.

Part 4E - Cats

The Village Office has received complaints regarding cats roaming onto private property and leaving their "mark". Cat owners are asked to please have consideration for your neighbours and keep your cat on your own property and limit their need to roam.

Owners of outdoor cats **must** have the cat spayed or neutered.

No more than three cats over the age of 12 weeks are allowed and each cat must have sufficient identification kept affixed to it by means of a collar, harness, traceable tattoo, microchip or other suitable device, so if someone finds a cat at large in the Village it can be identified and returned to the owner.

Part 4J - Wildlife

Residents must not intentionally feed or leave food out for the purpose of feeding the following wildlife: deer, raccoons, skunks, squirrels, feral rabbits, bears, coyotes, cougars, wolves, or other animals designated as dangerous wildlife under the *Wildlife Act*, RSBC 1996, c. 488 or feral cats or cats without identification. Animal feed must not be kept outside a building unless it is stored in a fully enclosed container that is capable of keeping out rats, bears, raccoons and other wildlife.

Residents can find more information on the above and on the keeping of other animals within the Village in the Animal Responsibility Bylaw 922 on our website.

A reminder to all pet owners — Please do your part to control the pet population — have all your pets spayed or neutered.

Residents Living Along Fruitvale Creek

Residents along Fruitvale Creek are reminded to keep all grass clippings, tree clippings and other debris out of Fruitvale Creek as these items plug the grizzlies (grates) and cause the creek to flood.

Spring Clean-up

Mark your calendars for Spring Clean-up on **Friday, April 22 and Monday, April 25.** *Only Organic Materials will be collected.* Tree cuttings must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet in length and must be piled at your usual garbage collection location. All other *organic* material must be bagged in *transparent bags* (do not use your Village of Fruitvale garbage bags) and placed at your usual garbage collection area early; collections will begin at 7:30am. Please Note: Recyclable and household materials, rocks and cardboard will not be picked up.

Trash to Treasure Day

This 1-day event is your chance to help reduce waste by giving away your gently used unwanted household items and claiming old treasures from your neighbours.

In celebration of Earth Day (April 22), Trash to Treasure Day will be held on **Saturday, April 23**. To participate: Collect your unwanted, gently used household items - Place them by the curb for treasure hunters to access them without disrupting traffic - Create a lawn sign to let treasure hunters know your items are up for grabs (or download a sign at www.rdkb.com) - Remove all remaining items by 4:00 pm. Have fun!

Catch Basins, Storm Sewers & Street Sweeping

During the month of April, the Public Works Department will be busy cleaning catch basins and storm sewers throughout the Village and the street sweeper will be cleaning the streets. Please be patient during the street cleaning process – all streets will be done.

Property owners are reminded when raking winter sand from the boulevards **do not** rake it into piles on the street. This causes damage to the sweeper brooms.

Please be aware of the men and equipment on the roads and exercise caution at all times. **Thank you for your cooperation.**

Temporary Vehicle Shelters

Residents with temporary vehicle shelters in their front yard are reminded that these portable garages must be removed by **Thursday, April 15** as per Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 863.

Community Volunteer Income Tax Preparation - Free Income Tax Service for Greater Trail Residents

This **free** service is available to low-income individuals who satisfy certain limits and restrictions. No appointments; interviews are on a first-come basis. Please arrive at least 15 minutes before the posted closing time. Due to COVID-19 the returns will be a done by a modified drop off process.

Annual income maximum guidelines are as follows:

Single person	\$35,000
Two persons in family	\$45,000
More than two persons	\$2,500 for each additional person

Persons with investment/interest income in excess of \$1,000, capital gains/losses, partnership income, rental income, business or professional income, farming or fishing income, bankruptcy, or anyone with complex deductions may be deemed **ineligible** for this service. Also, we are unable to prepare final returns for deceased persons. Other limitations may apply.

COVID-19 protocols are in place so wear your mask and maintain social distancing. Returns will not be completed on site as was an option in prior years.

March 1 to April 30 from 9:00am to 11:00am at three locations listed as follows:

Tuesday at Trail United Church, 1300 Pine Ave, Trail. Last interview April 19. Last date for pickup—April 26.

Wednesday at the **Royal Canadian Legion**, 2141 Columbia Ave, in East Trail, (next to Columbia Glass). Enter via ramp at south end. Last interview April 20. Last date for pickup April 27.

Thursday at Waneta Plaza, where Ricki's used to be. Last interview April 21. Last date for pickup April 28.

Be sure to bring all essential documents and receipts to the interview. We require a piece of government photo ID. If possible, bring your copy of the previous year's return and/or the CRA Notice of Assessment for the previous year. You will be asked to complete a questionnaire that we will use to complete your taxes.

If you are eligible to receive the GST credit or other credits, you **must** file a tax return by May 2 to ensure timely receipt of quarterly payments which commence at the beginning of July.
