We are working on a potential Creekside Park project that will stretch from the existing park all the way to the Fruitvale Memorial Centre (FMC) to enhance the beauty and atmosphere of our downtown and potentially add a gazebo and outdoor amenities behind the FMC to facilitate outdoor weddings and other celebrations that can pair with the hall. We have grant funding for an Economic Development/Branding project to define who we are and showcase our appeal to small business, and we are hopeful for grant funding to support a Fruitvale Memorial Centre masterplan of which the intent is to set the stage to make the facility more user friendly for weddings, celebrations of any kind, live performing arts such as music and dance to draw people to our downtown core and expand on the great little businesses we already have. Lots of exciting things on the horizon to shape Fruitvale's future!

From all of us here at the Village of Fruitvale, be kind, be patient, be safe, and have a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year with those closest to you.

Residents are advised that the Village of Fruitvale Office is closed to the public until further notice as a proactive measure to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The Village provides essential and critical services such as water, sewer and garbage, and because we have a very small staff that must work very closely together and we do not have the resources to certify all employees in the operations of our essential and critical services of water and sewer, it is imperative that the Village protect our essential workers as much as possible to ensure essential and critical services remain operational.

GARBAGE BAGS: For residents needing garbage bags, please call the Village Office to make arrangements for pick-up.

Please note, staff will not be in the office from December 24 to January 3. For Emergencies during that time call 250-367-6161.

2021 DOG TAGS (licenses)

The 2021 dog tags (licenses) will be available for purchase on **January 4, 2021**. Call the office to make arrangements for purchase and pick-up of your dog tag.

All dogs in the Village are required to be licensed. Cost for a license is \$25.00 for a spayed or neutered dog and \$75.00 for an unaltered dog. A current year tag on your dog will ensure that it is returned to you if it is found out of your yard. It's a small price to pay for the safe return of your family pet.

Please remember that it is a contravention of the Dog Tax and Regulation Bylaw No. 728 to allow your dogs to run free. Dogs at large run the risk of being picked up by the SPCA and fines will be levied to the dog owner.

Please, for the safety, peace and comfort of your neighbours, ensure your dog(s) are secure in your house or yard and do not let them bark continually at all hours day and night.

OUTSTANDING PROPERTY TAXES AND UTILITIES

All outstanding 2020 property taxes and utilities are due by **December 31, 2020**. Outstanding taxes and utilities as of January 1, 2021 will be transferred to property taxes in arrears and accrue daily interest.

With the Village Office being closed to the public, please choose one of the options below to make your payment:

- E-transfer to finance@village.fruitvale.bc.ca (make sure to reference you roll number or street address and whether the payment is for taxes, utilities, garbage bags, etc.)
- Through on-line banking for taxes and utilities (allow 3 business days for payment to reach the office)
- Drop your payment in the drop box at the front entrance of the Village Office
- Mail your payments to the Village Office
- Use the PayTM app on your phone or tablet

To avoid interest, all payments must reach the Village Office by December 31, 2020, including those sent by mail and made through online banking.

Background on some of the names listed above:

BEAVER SIDING was the name given by the Nelson and Fort Sheppard Railway to an area in the valley where the train could stop after climbing the hill from the Columbia River Valley to allow the steam engine to get water. When the townsite was subdivided, around 1907, it was given the name Fruitvale to attract farming settlers to the area.

SHIRLEY LEVESQUE is a long-time resident of Fruitvale and was instrumental in bringing junior hockey, the Beaver Valley Nitehawks, to Fruitvale in 1981. She also played a number of years of slo-pitch in Beaver Valley. Shirley is no stranger to sports in Fruitvale.

ELLA MATTEUCCI started playing baseball in Fruitvale at the age of 3. As a senior in high school she was the only female on the boys' baseball team, the Notre Dame Hounds. She pitched a no-hitter for against a midget AA boys' team. She's played on Team BC and was a member of the Canadian Women's National Baseball team which won a silver medal at the 2015 Pan American Games. Her love of sports did not stop at baseball. She played women's hockey for four years while attending Clarkson University and became known for her defensive play on the fifth-ranked defence in the country. She went on to play in the Canadian Women's Hockey League with the Markham Thunder. Most recently Ella was recruited by the Toronto Blue Jays as an ambassador of their "Girls at Bat" program that looks at ways to support girls across the country to overcome barriers and make sport and recreational opportunities more accessible.

BOULEVARD PARKING DURING SNOW REMOVAL

Residents are reminded that during the winter months you must find off-street parking as the boulevard is where snow is to be when public works is plowing and pushing back snow.

Vehicles parked on the boulevard during snow removal are subject to being plowed in or towed away at the owner's expense. Snow removed to create a boulevard parking space must be stored on either the boulevard or your own property and not placed back on the street. Also, anyone found creating a snow berm at the curb to make a "parking space" on the boulevard will be asked to remove it.

A number of safety and liability issues arise whenever a road is effectively blocked, as is the case when residents pile snow in travel lanes. Residents and emergency vehicles can be impeded, forcing the Village to remove the snow. Please be advised that the cost of an additional call-out to clear a blocked street shall be billed to the appropriate address.

The Village cannot condone the transport or plowing of snow by non-contracted private parties from properties along the Village streets due to liability issues. The Village therefore kindly requests the full cooperation and collaboration of all its residents during snowfall. If there is a compelling set of circumstances that do not allow on-site snow storage in line with Village policy, Fruitvale officials will address that problem.

DID YOU KNOW - BUDGETS

At this time each year Council begins budget deliberations for the next year. The process begins with Council reviewing the current services provided by the Village such as sewer, garbage, road and sidewalk maintenance, snow clearing, storm water management, special events, development, etc.

The costs of those services are then estimated for the next year.

Council then looks at different ways of funding those costs whether it is from grants, user fees, donations or some other source of funding. Any costs that cannot be funded from other sources must be funded through taxation.

As part of the process Council makes every effort to find better and less costly ways to deliver services and to reduce services that are not of value to taxpayers. This process is meant to keep tax rates as low as possible while also ensuring residents are receiving the services they most need today.
