GARBAGE RECEPTACLES ON MAIN STREET

The garbage receptacles on the Main Street sidewalk are NOT for residential use. Residents who have been utilizing these receptacles for their household garbage are asked to please stop doing so. Thank you for your cooperation.

If you require Village of Fruitvale garbage bags, please contact the Village Office to make arrangements to pick up and/or purchase extra bags.

WILD ANIMALS AND FOOD ATTRACTANTS

It's that time of year when the bears and other wild animals are awake and hungry. In order to stop the animals from coming to your house, you must remove the attractant.

- Store your garbage and recycling in a secure and enclosed area to prevent access to the bears;
- Make sure your compost bin is moist and well ventilated;
- Limit or remove bird feeders;
- Keep your BBQ clean;
- Do not leave ripe fruit on trees and remove any unwanted fruit trees.

Residents are also reminded to keep their household garbage in a secure location <u>until the morning of garbage day</u>. Garbage not placed securely is being picked up by hungry bears and other animals, ripped open and strewn across the neighbourhood then has to be cleaned up by someone else. We all need to do our part.

BURNING REGULATIONS

Village of Fruitvale residents are reminded that open burning in the Village is prohibited throughout the year. Only 0.5 metre x 0.5 metre backyard campfires are allowed and only dry seasoned firewood to be burned. Please have a water hose readily available. Extinguish your fire when left unattended.

Currently in the Southeast Fire District Category 2 and Category 3 open fires are banned. It is important to exercise caution when you are outdoors, not only when enjoying a campfire or off-roading in the back-country, but also in using tools and handling, storing and disposing of materials and fuels. Prevention means stopping wildfires start. Discarded before they cigarette butts, campfires, hot exhaust pipes coming into contact with dry grass and vegetation, power tools (such as chainsaws), Tiki torches and even discarded glass can all ignite a wildfire. We all must do our part to prevent human-caused wildfires and protect public safety.

BEAVER VALLEY WATER SERVICE REGULATIONS

With the warmer weather upon us, users of the Beaver Valley Water Service are reminded that Level 1 water regulations are in effect.

- · Odd numbered house water on odd numbered days,
- Even numbered houses water on even numbered days,
- Only one sprinkler per household
- Sprinkling times are:
 - ◆ 7:00 am to 10:00 am
 - ◆ 7:00 pm to 10:00 pm
- Underground Sprinkler Systems are to be set to water between 1:00 am & 6:00 am for 20-minute intervals per zone,



- Ensure water stays on the lawn and garden and does not run down driveways and sidewalks or onto the street,
- Please refrain from sprinkling when it is raining.
