Remembrance Day: Please buy a wreath or make a donation to the Royal Canadian Legion to support Vets and their families. As there will be fewer opportunities this year to gather in honour of our Vets, please pause at 11:00 am for two minutes of silence to honour those who fought for our freedom.

What is the Federal Gas Tax Fund? How is it Invested in your Community?

Infrastructure maintenance & improvements for services such as transportation, communication, water safety & public sanitation are very costly. In fact, it is impossible for most local governments to keep up with those costs; yet, local governments are responsible for keeping all the wheels greased & the motors running.

To help offset costs, the Federal Government introduced the Gas Tax Fund (GTF) in 2005 to provide communities with ongoing funding. The program currently funds over \$2 billion in projects across the country.

One of the first successful projects had Area A Gas Tax monies merged with the Western Diversification Funds to build a much needed water tower to serve the Columbia Gardens Industrial Park. That project resulted in a safe, sustainable water system for the industrial park land, & now helps enhance investors' decision-making when considering the area for business.

In 2014, as the GTF program evolved, eligibility expanded to include projects related to culture, tourism, sports & recreation. This was a very welcome change in scope, & local governments took advantage of the opportunity.

Because Area A, Fruitvale, Montrose, & Beaver Falls enjoy a close civic relationship, cooperation with grant funding & seeking joint projects is common as we aim for outcomes that support residents throughout the Beaver Valley. I like to say that I live in the Beaver Valley. We are one community in many ways. The more we share, the more we all benefit. And, joint projects play an important part in reducing greenhouse gases, when services are shared, & in accessible locations.

GTF projects that Area A has supported:

- South Columbia Search & Rescue: Hall Upgrade
- Fruitvale Elementary School: Playground
- Beaver Valley Family Park: Solar Hot Water/ Electrical & Washroom Upgrades
- Village of Fruitvale: RV Park
- Beaver Valley Arena: Lighting Upgrades
- Champion Lakes Golf Course: New Metal Roof/Lighting Upgrades/Deck Rails
- Beaver Creek Park: First Nations Arbor

Area A has contributed over \$700,000 to help improve facilities and parks that we all enjoy. With success under our belts, more Beaver Valley projects will be upcoming. Stay tuned!

Update: Last month, I wrote about road maintenance challenges, and this month, I am happy to give A Big Shout Out to YRB for completing the ditching work for Area A. Thanks for hearing us.

Mayor's Message

I hope November finds everyone healthy and safe. October has been a very busy month for the Village as we've had multiple meetings covering childcare needs, affordable housing, economic development/re-branding, Association of Kootenay Boundary Local Government AGM and a 6hr AKBLG education session entitled "Connecting with our Communities". It has been busy, but exciting.

Our recent Childcare Needs Assessment for the Beaver Valley (Montrose, Area A, and Fruitvale) which included a survey that was completed by more than 120 families showed us that:

- there are only 102 childcare spaces for 705 children.
- there is a 14% coverage rate, anything below 33% is considered a childcare desert.
- 328 new spaces are required to meet the current need (some children are cared for by extended family or friends).

These findings strongly support our funding application to build a childcare facility on the former middle school site.

On October 9, our sitting and recently re-elected MLA Katrine Conroy came to Fruitvale on her election tour and I took the opportunity to explain the many projects and partnerships we are working on in the Village. I was pleased that her team called and organized another visit on Friday October 16 to visit the middle school site and go over the masterplan for the project. She was very excited about the proposed daycare as that is within her ministry, and the affordable housing piece; she committed to do all she can to work with us to find the funding to demolish the school.

In my role as Municipal Director on the RDKB and the Utilities Committee, we discussed a new water restriction structure for next year as well as a water smart ambassador for the summer months to help educate residents on easy ways to reduce water consumption. At BV Recreation we have discussed moving the historic Park Siding School into town to Railway Park so it can be more readily accessible to people and our elementary school for viewing. BV Rec is also working on a partnership between multiple parties including Columbia Basin Trust, Area A, Montrose, Fruitvale, ATCO Wood Products, and a CERIP Grant to build a replica train station alongside the railway in Railway Park that can be used to display Beaver Valley and Pend d'Oreille Historical Society artifacts, hold small gatherings, and host the ATCO sponsored train rides. We have also applied for grants to upgrade Creekside Park for removal of the crumbling retaining wall and fence, to provide access to the creek for summer use and to install sitting areas to enjoy the creek. We have a lot of irons in the fire right now; it's an exciting time for the valley and we look forward to working with our partners and residents to see the projects through to completion.

One of the unfortunate casualties of COVID-19 is the cancellation of our well-attended Remembrance Day Service on November 11th. In its place, we ask that everyone go outside for two minutes of silence from 11:00am to 11:02am. We will mark the start and finish with a siren or train whistle.

Kudos to the people of our Beaver Valley Food Bank and the wonderful work they do year round to support our people.

Please always remember to keep your eye open for a friend, neighbour, or anyone that may need a small act of kindness to make their life more manageable. Be kind, be calm, and be safe.

REMEMBRANCE DAY - WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 11

Due to COVID-19 and current provincial health orders, there will be no Remembrance Day service at the Fruitvale Cenotaph this year.

In lieu of the ceremony and luncheon that normally follows the service, the Village of Fruitvale Office will be accepting donations for Legion members beginning Monday, November 2 until 4:00pm on Friday, November 6.

Area A and the Village of Fruitvale are donating \$500 each to our local Royal Canadian Legion and ask that you please consider purchasing a wreath or making a donation to the Royal Canadian Legion to support Vets and their families. BOULEVARD PARKING DURING SNOW REMOVAL

Residents are reminded that during the winter months the boulevard is where snow is to be when plowing and pushing back snow. This means that residents are required to find off-street parking during the winter months.

Anyone parked on the boulevard is subject to their vehicle being plowed in during snow removal. Snow removed to create a boulevard parking space must be stored on the boulevard and not placed back on the street. Also, anyone found creating a snow berm at the curb to make a "parking space" on the boulevard will be asked to remove it.

A number of safety and liability issues arise whenever a road is effectively blocked, as is the case when residents pile snow in travel lanes. Residents and emergency vehicles can be impeded, forcing the Village to remove the snow. Please be advised that the cost of an additional call-out to clear a blocked street shall be billed to the appropriate address.

The Village cannot condone the transport or plowing of snow by non-contracted private parties from properties along the Village streets due to liability issues. The Village therefore kindly requests the full cooperation and collaboration of all its residents during snowfall. If there is a compelling set of circumstances that do not allow on-site snow storage in line with Village policy, Fruitvale officials will address that problem.

WINTER PREPARATIONS

In preparation for the upcoming snow removal season, the Public Works Department asks residents to remove recreational vehicles, basketball hoops, construction materials, solar lights, flower planters, and such from boulevards. The Bylaw Enforcement Officer will be patrolling boulevards and handing out notices to residents with items on the boulevard.





Residents with fences bordering Village streets are reminded to ensure their fences are strong enough to withstand loads from snow plowed and pushed back to widen streets. Public Works takes extreme care when pushing back snow, but damage is possible. The Village of Fruitvale is not responsible for damage to fences or other objects that may occur during the course of performing regular duties.

DID YOU KNOW?

Snow and Ice Management Costs

- It costs the Village of Fruitvale approximately \$16,000 each major snowfall to provide the Village's current level of snow management and ice control services.
- The Village budget includes 6 major snowfall events each year with Village taxpayers paying a total of \$96,000 for snow management and ice control services.
- To provide residential snow plowing and sanding on weekends or after hours increases the costs for each snow event by \$2,500 to a total of \$18,500 which increases the total costs of snow management and ice control services to \$111,000.
- This increase translates into an extra \$22.00 in taxes payable by residents owning a home valued at \$350,000.

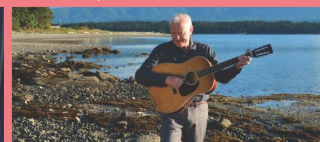

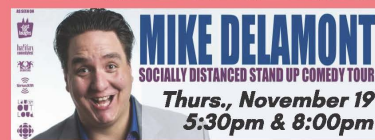
