Winter Preparations

In preparation for the upcoming snow removal season, the Public Works Department asks residents to remove all recreational vehicles, basketball hoops, construction material, solar lights, flower planters, and such from boulevards. Boulevards must be cleared of such items by November 1, 2021.

Residents with fences bordering Village streets are reminded to ensure their fences are strong enough to withstand loads from snow plowed and pushed back to widen streets. Public Works takes extreme care when pushing back snow, but damage is possible. The Village of Fruitvale is not responsible for damage to fences or other objects that may occur during the course of performing regular duties.

Boulevard Parking During Snow Removal

Residents are reminded that during the winter months snow is plowed onto the Village boulevard. Residents are required to find off-street parking during the winter months. Anyone parked on the boulevard may be blocked.

Snow removed to create a boulevard parking space must be stored on private property and not placed back on the street. Anyone found creating a snow berm at the curb to make a "parking space" on the boulevard will be asked to remove it.

Safety and liability issues arise whenever a road is blocked by residents piling snow in travel lanes. The Village cannot condone the transport or plowing of snow by non-contracted private parties from properties along the Village streets due to liability issues. The Village therefore kindly requests the full cooperation and collaboration of all its residents during snowfall.

Columbia Gardens Road Crosswalk and Line Painting

Residents are advised that the crosswalks and line painting on the newly paved Columbia Gardens Road will not be done until spring due to weather conditions. Drivers are asked to be aware of the crosswalk signs, watch for pedestrians crossing the street and take extra care when using Columbia Gardens Road. Pedestrians are asked to be aware of vehicles and to cross the road when it is safe to do so.



Area A - November Update

Update on the Beaver Valley Train Station/Museum in Fruitvale's pole yard—still chugging along!

The design work is almost complete and should wrap up by the end of December, thanks to Scott Weatherford of Atco Wood Products! We are still working with Burlington Northern on finalizing a lease agreement for the property. The agreement will permit the construction of the train station, the relocation of the Park Schoolhouse to the property, and the construction of a replica water tower on site (some time in the future). Beaver Valley Recreation, in partnership with Atco Wood Products, is still on track to support the construction in 2022. We hope you are as excited as we are! Local budget planning

At this time of year, elected leaders begin the budgeting process at the Regional District Board table. This is one of the most important roles for each of the Directors who serve on the Board, as we each fulfill our legal responsibility to review, understand, analyze, amend and approve 70 different service budgets. Elected representatives at the municipal and regional levels are diligent in ensuring that spending reflects what taxpayers need and want for high quality living! When should we borrow? What tax increase is appropriate, if any? When should we tap into reserves?

Each RDKB department creates a work plan and budget, requesting financial support. It is a long and detailed process. Our final budgets are required to reflect five-year planning, AND many services also work towards long term planning for up to 25 years. So, how does it work? Here are the basics:

- Consider the "big ticket" items as they have significant impacts on forecasting.
- Develop and amend policies that guide the process.
- Review and understand the context of the numbers; are there big swings in any area and is there data to support the changes?
- Align the budget with Board priorities as determined with our strategic plans and goals.
- Be realistic about what taxpayers will be asked to pay for.

- Ensure that there are healthy reserves: where do we need them?
- Ensure controls are in place for authority to adjust budget/expenses; accountability.
- Include long-term capital improvement plans.
- Intentionally search out savings and efficiencies.
- Utilize historical data for comparisons and benchmarks.
- Ensure RDKB staff take advantage of grant funding streams.

Budgeting is a major undertaking for staff and RDKB directors, and one of our key responsibilities. It is not taken lightly! Much effort goes into making tax dollars work for all, in the *best* way possible. Over the coming months, we will be working on a \$80 million budget, aiming to finalize spending targets in February, with approval slated for March. We will do our utmost to spend and invest tax dollars in ways that support our people and communities in the best ways possible. Thank you.

Village of Fruitvale - November Update

It's great to see the amount of asphalt resurfacing completed in and around Fruitvale this late summer/fall. The Ministry of Transportation is completing Highway 3B from Fruitvale to the Bombi Junction, Caughlin Road and Green Road on Fruitvale's perimeter and Columbia Gardens Road. The Village of Fruitvale was able to partner with the Ministry's program and have the section of Columbia Gardens Road within the Village resurfaced at significant savings from what the Municipality would pay on our own. Pine Avenue should be completed this fall too, if the weather holds, and will include an asphalt sidewalk like the one on Columbia Gardens Road to provide a safe walkway to the recreational amenities of the Curling Rink and Arena.

Lest we Forget

Planning continues on Phase One of the Middle School site with the Lower Columbia Affordable Housing 31-unit complex (17 - 1 bdrm, 8 - 2bdrm, and 6 - 3bdrm), and a renewed application for a 30+ space childcare centre. Water, sewer, and gas utilities have been stubbed out from under Columbia Gardens Road prior to paving.

On October 15th the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Josie Osborne, hosted a Zoom meeting for Regional District Board Chairs & Mayors of the Southern Interior. She requested that we come prepared to share what each of our municipality's issues and opportunities are in 2022. I laid out Council's holistic plan to support economic recovery, keep people healthy & active, build a vibrant downtown core, and support the development of affordable housing. I explained we are doing this by working with our partners in BV Recreation to add to our Webster Road Hiking trail, building a bike park in Lower Mazzochi Park, building an early 1900's era-correct Train Station along the railroad tracks downtown (with strong support from our friends at ATCO Wood Products and Columbia Basin Trust) and moving the historic Park Siding School into town adjacent to the train station so people can enjoy it and it can be used by the Elementary School as a teaching tool. Fruitvale is also working on the affordable housing project with the Lower Columbia Affordable Housing Society at the Middle School site as well as exploring further options for the second and third phases of that site. We were successful in receiving a \$25,000 grant to plan an active transportation network throughout Fruitvale and connect with the proposed South Columbia "Green Link" from Rossland thru Fruitvale to provide safe cycling, walking, and scooter travel throughout Fruitvale and to and from our neighbours. With the fantastic support of Columbia Basin Trust we were able to purchase the land between our RV Park and the veterinary clinic alongside the creek. In 2022 we want to plan the transformation of this land into a nice greenspace extension of Creekside Park with potentially a gazebo/stage where outdoor events such as music in the park, outdoor weddings or other celebrations can happen with the Fruitvale Memorial Centre and its kitchen close at hand. I also pointed out to Minister Osborne our two main issues are the cost of servicing our development on the Middle School Site, and the cost of demolition or repurposing the Middle School to housing and welcomed any support she could provide. We will be meeting again with Minister Osborne in early December.

We have lots of work ahead to complete this year and a full year in 2022. It will be exciting to see further activity downtown and on the middle school site next year.

It's unfortunate we cannot gather to honour our fallen this Remembrance Day, but I encourage you to take a few moments on November 11th at 11:00 am to remember the sacrifices made by our Beaver Valley residents to defend our freedom.

The Fruitvale Memorial Cemetery daily hours are 7:00 am to 9:00 pm.


Artificial flowers are permitted in the Fruitvale Memorial Cemetery from October 1 to May 1.

Fresh flowers are permitted in the Cemetery from May 1 to September 30.

After October 1^{st} in each year, the installation of monuments will be subject to weather conditions. Once there is ground frost and a layer of snow on the ground, the cemetery will cease the installation of flat monuments.

Family members are permitted to enter the Cemetery to clear the area around a loved one's memorial marker if the grass has overgrown the edge of the marker.

Are you interested in firefighting and serving your community? Kootenay Boundary Regional Fire Rescue Station 376 - Fruitvale needs firefighters. Application forms can be picked up at KBRFR Headquarters located at #201-843 Rossland Avenue, Trail BC.

Applicants must be 19 years or older and possess a valid driver's license.

Applications must include a driver's abstract and criminal record check. Criminal record checks will be returned and all information will be kept confidential.

House Numbers and 9-1-1 Emergencies

Residents are reminded that house numbers must be displayed so the house can be found easily and quickly in an emergency.

House numbers should be:

- Displayed in a location visible to traffic travelling in both directions;
- A colour that contrasts with the background;
- Visible at night;
- At least 6" in height;
- Posted both at the driveway entrance and house or other structure if you have a long driveway.

Please, if your house number is not displayed, have it installed as soon as possible. It could save your life.

Streetlights

Residents are asked to report non-working streetlights to the Village Office at 250-367-7551 or by email to <u>info@village.fruitvale.bc.ca</u>. We will need to know the problem with the light, its location and, if possible, the number on the pole in order to report the non-working streetlight to FortisBC. FortisBC will send out a line crew to repair the streetlights however this may take a little time as they prefer to have a few non-working lights to repair when they come to town
