Canruss Paramedic Oil Services Ltd. of Surrey, BC Assists Village with its Future



Area A - September Update

Electoral Area 'A' Director Ali Grieve, RDKB

Hot, Dry Summer - Heat, Fires & Smoke: I am writing this newsletter at the same time as I'm receiving official notice regarding a small fire on Nine Mile Road; it was responded to very quickly, early in the morning of August 4. Weather conditions were also favourable for successful suppression of the fire. Thank you to fire crews locally, and throughout the world. Again: To all local firefighters for keeping communities safe - a thousand thank-you's from everyone!

Bus Shelters

You may have noticed some initial improvements to the bus stops in Area A and on the borders of the Village of Fruitvale. Mayor Morissette and I met in the spring with Ministry of Transportation, a YRB Manager, and the Manager of Operations from the RDKB to coordinate efforts and grant monies to improve the bus stops. We thank all partners for helping create better bus stops/shelters for current and potential users. Using transit is a way for people to help manage climate change; a small but important contribution. Jump on a bus one day, and see how quickly you can get to work or get your shopping errands done!

Active Transportation Corridors

Mayor Morissette and I participated in some discussions on connecting Lower Columbia communities with Active Transportation Corridors. Progress has been made with the completion of bike routes from Rossland to Warfield, and Warfield to Trail. We see great potential for the last leg: the Trail to Fruitvale route. South Columbia Green Link is the group currently working with local governments. We hope to create a safe corridor down Columbia Gardens Road, which will join Highway 22. Stay tuned.

Road Re-surfacing

The Ministry of Transportation, along with YRB roadworks have spent considerable time in Area A over the past two years ensuring road maintenance is current, and completing upgrades as needed. To date, ditching, brush clearing, bus stop improvements, and local road resurfacing have all been completed. I know we all appreciate those efforts and improvements. YRB Manager Scott Maxwell: "Yellowhead Road and Bridge has been thrilled to be able to focus resources on improving roads and pads for coming transit shelters around Fruitvale and Area A over the past year. We received feedback from many people in the area on the need for these improvements and the local Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure in partnership with the Begional District.

Transportation and Infrastructure in partnership with the Regional District has been great in supporting us to complete this work."

Summer 2021 has been very busy and eventful for our Village. Following are some of the things that have been announced and we are working on this summer:

- Fruitvale is the first interior Municipality to become a Certified Living Wage Employer. This means all permanent employees and long term contracts (such as Janitorial) must be paid the area's living wage which is currently \$18.83/hr.
- The Lower Columbia Affordable Housing Society and Fruitvale were notified that our application for a 28-31 unit affordable housing complex was approved by BC Housing so we started bi-weekly planning meetings in early July.
- We held an initial meeting with an official from the BC Housing Hub to look at funding solutions for the demolition of the former Middle School and interesting incentives for developing affordable housing for young families, singles, and downsizing seniors on the site.
- A site survey of the Middle School Development has been completed laying out the footprint of Phase 1 along Columbia Gardens Road and the new street that will connect Columbia Gardens and Green Road.
- Working to have services for Phase 1 stubbed out from under Columbia Gardens Road prior to repaying that will happen this fall.
- Attended BC Games information meeting around the joint application of Trail/Rossland to host the 2026 BC Winter Games (Fruitvale Elementary will likely be used for housing athletes).
- Resurfacing of Pine Avenue and with a sidewalk as on Columbia Gardens Road is scheduled for this fall.
- Highway resurfacing between Fruitvale and the Bombi junction is scheduled this fall.
- Our Economic Development and Re-Branding project is moving forward with our consultant, who came to town to get a visual and held a couple of meetings with our group over the summer to move the project forward. Residents are asked to complete the on-line survey before September 15, 2021 at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/Fruitvale.
- I joined the South Kootenay Active Transportation Society to help move the proposed "Green Link" between Fruitvale and Rossland forward from our end. I can see the benefit of a dedicated and safe active transportation route for commuters, recreation, and tourism, we have been meeting regularly.
- I also was elected from the Regional District Board of Directors to represent our area on the ETSI BC (Economic Trust of the Southern Interior) Regional Advisory Committee, from that Committee I was elected to the ETSI BC Board of Directors where I can learn more about Economic Development in our region and influence decision making on project funding support.

Thank you for your patience this summer as we deal with challenging water supply issues and the attendant changes in water restrictions.

As you can see it has been very positive and productive summer and we look forward to a busy autumn.

Please get your covid vaccines so we can move forward safely with open businesses and social activities; Be kind, Be calm, and Be safe.

Village of Fruitvale Property Tax Sale

The Village of Fruitvale's 2021 Tax Sale is scheduled for 10:00 am sharp on Monday, September 27, 2021 at the Village of Fruitvale Office.

Letters have been sent to those property owners in a tax sale situation. If your property taxes are in delinquent status (three years of unpaid taxes - 2019, 2020 and 2021) you must pay the delinquent (2019) taxes before September 27, 2021 to keep your property from being sold at the tax sale.

A listing of tax sale properties will appear in the September 16 and 21 editions of the Trail Times. In order to keep your property from appearing in the newspaper advertisements, the delinquent taxes must be paid in full prior to September 16, 2021.

Payment of delinquent taxes must be made by cash, certified cheque, online banking or electronic transfer of funds.

The Village of Fruitvale has An Official Community Plan (OCP) that establishes the long term vision of our community. The goals and policies within the OCP form the framework used by Council, Staff and the community to guide their decisions pertaining to land use and development. The OCP also provides guidance for economic, environmental, physical design and social well being of the community.

In conjunction with the Official Community Plan, the Village of Fruitvale has a Zoning Bylaw that provides a clear and efficient system of land use regulation for the orderly, economic, equitable and environmentally sensitive use, development, and redevelopment of all lands within the Village of Fruitvale.

Latest news: Mazzochi bike pump park coming soon!

The Beaver Valley Recreation and Parks Committee has approved the construction of a Bike Pump Park on lower Mazzochi Park in Fruitvale. Scouts Canada, owners of the park land, have given the Committee the green light for this project, which has been awarded to Terraform Earthworks out of Nelson.

The goal of the Bike Pump Park will be to create a track that is inviting to beginner and intermediate riders alike but can still be fast and "flowy" for advanced riders. This will be achieved by building rollers and berms that are consistent in their size, shape and frequency while having multiple line choices for entering the track as well as direction change options once you are inside the track.

Once the Bike Pump Park is completed, the main access to the Bike Pump Park will be through the main gate located on Columbia Gardens Road.

Burning Bans and Wildfires

As of Noon on Friday August 27, 2021, campfires are allowed in the Cranbrook, Invermere, Columbia, Arrow and Kootenay Lake fire zones, however campfires remain prohibited in the Boundary fire zone. Category 2 and 3 open burning remain prohibited in all zones.

The current prohibition against any open fire larger than a campfire (ie: larger than 0.5 metres wide by 0.5 metres high) remains in effect throughout the Southeast Fire Centre. A map of the affected areas and their associated prohibitions is available online http://w.ly/JGbf50FXhcy

The following equipment and activities remain prohibited throughout the Southeast Fire Centre:

- Category 2 and Category 3 open fires, as defined in the Wildfire Regulation;
- the use of burn barrels and burn cages;
- the use of air curtain burners;
- the use of sky lanterns;
- the use of fireworks, including firecrackers; and
- the use of binary exploding targets.
