Area A Newsletter – October 2025

Topic: Seniors Advocate Visit – Thank You & Reflections

On July 16, our community had the honour of welcoming Dan Levitt, British Columbia's Seniors Advocate, to Fruitvale. I want to sincerely thank him for this important visit, and all the seniors who came and shared their stories at the Fruitvale Memorial Hall. Listening directly to those with lived experience is one of the most valuable tools we have for improving the care and support systems our seniors depend on.

Listening to Our Seniors

Every public service has its strengths and challenges. What matters most is that we continue to listen—especially to those who rely on these services. The insight shared by our seniors helps us see what's working and where there's room to improve.

As a public representative—and a taxpayer—I'm also mindful of the financial constraints that shape how services are delivered. Balancing fiscal responsibility with compassionate care is not always easy, but it is essential.

A Personal Perspective

My mother spent two years in long-term care, which gave me a deeper understanding of both the system's complexity and the people it serves. A few reflections:

- **Care homes are homes**—first and foremost—for the people who live there. That should always guide our approach to care.
 - **Not everyone has someone to advocate for them.** My mother had four children nearby. Many residents are alone and rely entirely on the system.
 - **Staffing challenges are real**, but I want to be clear: I have deep respect for the frontline workers who care for our elders. It's demanding work, and many do their best under difficult conditions.
 - **When staff shortages exist, they need to be addressed**—but we must also recognize the cost of doing so.
 - **A review of roles and responsibilities**—could support efficiency, ease pressure on staff, and maintain high-quality care.

Learning from Global Models

Around the world, innovative care models are showing how we can do better—while upholding dignity, autonomy, and connection. A few worth exploring:

- **Hogeweyk Dementia Village (Netherlands):** Prioritizes normalcy, freedom, and engagement.
- **Denmark:** Offers integrated, attractive communities with optional care.
- **Japan:** Known for innovative, culturally rooted senior care.
- **Sherbrooke, SK – Eden Alternative:** Builds intergenerational communities where residents live alongside children, students—even animals.
- **Langley, BC – The Village:** A mini-town site with a barn, animals, and rich programming in art, music, memory care, and physical activity.

These models show that compassionate, people-first care is not only possible—it's already happening. We need a range of approaches that are also affordable and accessible to all.

In Closing

My reflections are not a critique of those working in long-term care—far from it. I deeply appreciate the dedication of those on the front lines. These thoughts are part of a broader conversation on how we can continue to improve a system that will, one day, serve us all.

Thank you again to the Seniors Advocate for visiting our community, and to everyone who shared their voice. I support meaningful change that honours the seniors who helped build the communities we cherish today.

Mayor Wes Startup Village of Fruitvale




September has occupied Council with a few different issues and the annual Union of British Columbia Municipalities convention. As we enter into October Council's thoughts start to focus on our upcoming budget discussions and direction for 2026. From my perspective we have some things that we need to accomplish and a very long list of things we'd like to accomplish. It's always a bit of a balancing act but having been on Council now for three years I feel as though we have a pretty good sense of where we need to go over the next 14 or so months. In brief, here's where we're at:



Sewer Upgrades – under the watchful eye of our Public Works crew we have completed the sewer line replacement on McHale Lane, on time and on budget. We are now poised to start the 2nd phase of this two part project which involves re-lining the sewer line from the Search and Rescue building, through Dar Lane to McHale. Once completed infiltration of rain and melt water should be largely stopped adding years of operation to our sewer treatment plant.

Columbia Gardens Road – residents and Council remain concerned about speeding on this roadway. The Village Crew has added a crosswalk and signage at the ChldCare centre but we still observe excessive speed in the area. I encourage concerned residents to contact the RCMP as needed.



Budget – There is a need to establish a funding mechanism that addresses our long-term needs around infrastructure – things such as roads, stormwater, and sidewalks. To that end we are considering reducing the Sewer Parcel Tax by \$100 and directing \$100 into a new Infrastructure Parcel Tax. This will give the Village a dedicated fund to address our street issues.

UBCM – We were able to have an open and frank discussion with Ministry of Health about the challenges in hiring and keeping staff at the ChildCare Centre. We pointed out that publicly funded schools are poaching our staff due to higher wages and benefits and that this seemed to be an unfair advantage for our non-profit operators. I sense the message was heard and understood.

And finally, we continue our search for a new CAO and will start interviews in early October, hoping to have a final decision by month's end.

I hope that you'll reach out to me or other Council Members with comments and questions, we appreciate the feedback.

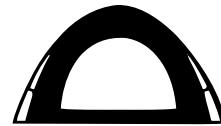
WINTER PREPARATIONS – BOULEVARDS AND PARKING

It's time for residents to prepare for the upcoming snow removal season, which means all items **must** be removed from boulevards, including but not restricted to:

***recreational vehicles *solar lights *basketball hoops
*construction material *flower planters/landscaping**

It also means that it's time for residents to find off-street and off-boulevard parking for their vehicles. Residents with fences bordering Village streets are reminded to ensure their fences are strong enough to withstand loads from snow plowed and pushed back to widen streets. Public Works takes extreme care when pushing back snow, but damage is possible. The Village of Fruitvale is not responsible for damage to fences or other objects that may occur during the course of performing regular duties.

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS

Beaver Street, Kootenay Avenue South, McHale Lane, Dar Lane, and Main Street North

The Village of Fruitvale will be relining approximately 500m of concrete sewer pipe in the downtown core using a Cured-in-Place Pipelining technique as well as rehabilitating associated manholes. The contractor is expected to be onsite in mid-October and wrapped up by early December.

Although we anticipate minimal disruptions from this project, residents and property owners may experience occasional service interruptions, traffic delays, and general construction noise during the delivery of this service.

Residents along **Beaver St, Kootenay Ave. S, McHale Lane, Dar Lane and Main St N** and all intersecting streets may be affected by this project.

Please see the attached map identifying the area being serviced. Please be respectful and mindful of crews working hard to improve our infrastructure and grow our community.

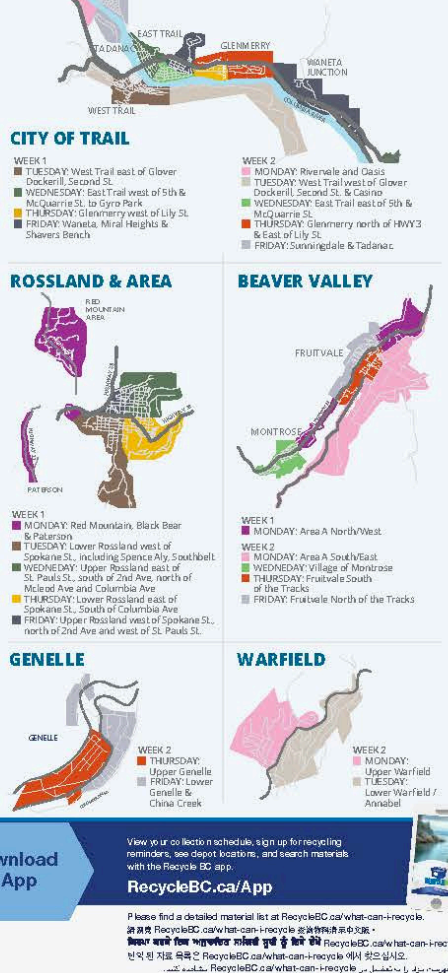

ENSURE MORE MATERIALS ARE RECYCLED AND KEPT OUT OF LANDFILL BY REMEMBERING THESE PRO-TIPS:

- Line it up.** Put your cardboard between your boxes, not on top. Leave about 1 m (3 feet) of space between recycling boxes and your garbage/recycling bins.
- Keep it clean.** Empty and rinse containers to prevent contamination, recycle more materials, and avoid attracting wildlife when you put them out for collection.
- Flatten and cut.** If your cardboard is too big for the blue box, flatten and cut it into smaller pieces, no larger than 76 cm x 76 cm (30 in x 30 in). Stack them loosely between your boxes. Don't forget to keep flexible plastics out of your recycling!
- Avoid litter.** Don't overfill your recycling boxes. If you can't fit everything comfortably, contact Recycle BC's collection partner to run an additional box or use a similar open box (like a laundry basket or storage box) to sort your material properly.
- We're here to help.** Download our app, email us at info@recyclebc.ca or reach out on social media @RecycleBC.

OOPS! Did you receive an Oops tag on collection day?

Our collection partners may leave these behind if your material is unable to be collected. The tag will indicate the issue.

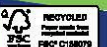

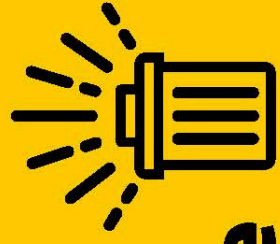

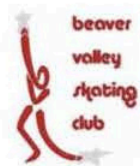


HALLOWEEN BONFIRE
